DATING THE... NON-AMERICAN CLOCK

At the September 2009 meeting, chapter member Ben Roberts gave an intriguing presentation regarding the dating of an American clock... but he took it all back at the November 2009 meeting.

When Ben first laid eyes on the clock, he had an inkling that the origins were of a Scottish nature, but the owner of the clock claimed the clock was first owned by a loyalist who came to North America in 1784, and was decidedly convinced the origins were American.

Further investigation proved the clock is actually Scottish, and dates to the 1820's.



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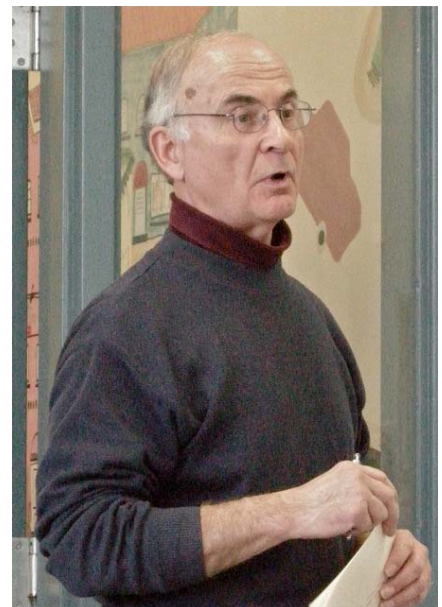
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WESTCLOX: INTERNATIONAL INTEREST

Most members are familiar with the work of Westclox vis à vis their product built in Canada and the United States, but as Allan Symons, Founder, Manager, and Curator of the Canadian Clock Museum, demonstrated at our November 2009 meeting, the company's production was much more international. Over the years, Westclox has had production lines in countries such as Australia, Germany, Scotland, China, Japan, and Brazil.

Allan's presentation included a display of many foreign (non-North American) made Westclox clocks, which were donated to the Canadian Clock Museum by Douglas Minty, President of NAWCC Chapter 72, Australia, and member of our own Ottawa Valley Chapter 111.



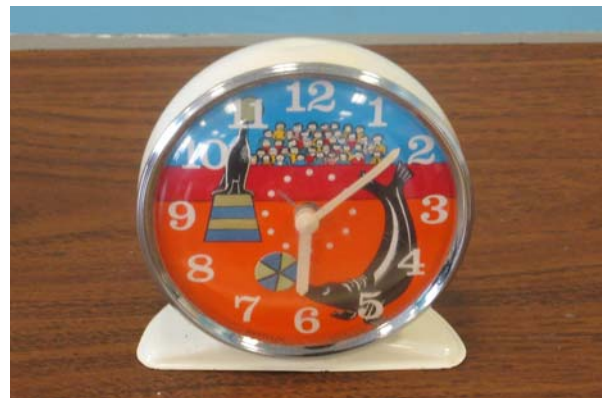

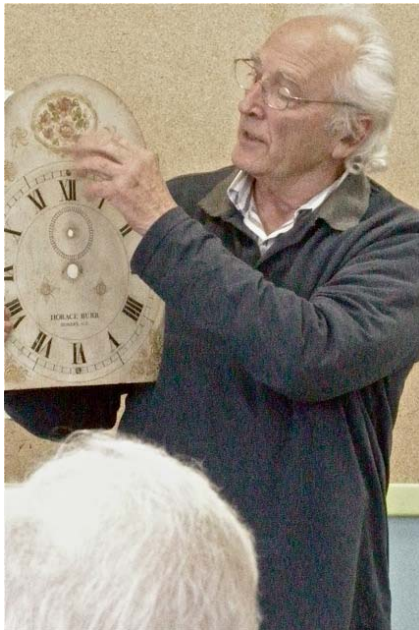

DATING THE... NON-AMERICAN CLOCK, CONT'D...

The images on the dial relate to the war of 1812. The paintings around the dial represent Britain and three allies including Sweden and Prussia. The battle scene depicted at the top of the dial is a representation of a specific battle: the capture of the USS Chesapeake by the HMS Shannon, off the Boston Harbour, on 1 June 1813.



WHITE DIAL CLOCKS

Chapter Member John Ruhland presented a talk about white dial clocks at the November 2009 meeting. Much of his findings were derived from the Brian Loomes book entitled "White Dial Clocks, the complete guide", which John highly recommends.

White dials were first introduced in 1770, in Birmingham. Though advertised as "porcelain", these dials were made of a steel plate painted white. Despite this, and contrary to common belief, white clock dials were actually more expensive than their brass counter-parts.

White dials gained popularity through the end of the eighteenth century. Painted dials began to emerge: dials that depicted strawberries, flowers, etc., in the corners. After 1825, models decorated with gilding could be found. Circa 1840~1860, the decorations on the dial became more intricate, depicting religious scenes, the four seasons, castles, etc.

American white dials are not as common, as the Americans usually bought their white dials from the British, even during the war.
